Final Paper

For your second and final major writing assignment of the semester, you will write a paper that answers the question:

What is rhetoric?

Much like the Question Paper, this paper is an argument based paper. In other words, your answer to the question of "what is rhetoric?" should take form *as an argument*. The goal of this paper is to formulate and justify a cohesive, multifaceted definition of rhetoric that aligns with your values, ethics, and goals. A successful Final Paper will include the following:

- A thesis statement which forwards an argument about what rhetoric is
- A complex, multifaceted, and unique definition of rhetoric that explains and illustrates the features that comprise rhetoric, its goal or purpose, and its potential to influence thought, understanding, and action
- Synthesis of *at least* 5 different rhetorical thinkers discussed in the course that demonstrates a robust understanding of their key theories, perspectives, and/or concepts related to rhetoric
